Students also contributed an article to the school newspaper about the trip and a further academic article was produced by Emily Gascoigne which considered the difficulties in learning about the holocaust.

	Impact on themselves	Through the Lessons from Auschwitz Project, tens of thousands of young people have had the opportunity to see for themselves the site of the former Nazi concentration and death camp Auschwitz-Birkenau. They return inspired and passionate about ensuring that the legacy of the Holocaust continues for generations to come, and having seen where antisemitism can lead they are committed to calling it out wherever it is found. They engage with scholarship before and after the trip and this plays a role in allowing them to make informed high quality interventions in the school community.
