Accelerated Reader Scheme

The first term has seen the continuation of our Accelerated Reader scheme in years 7 to 9. The main benefit of taking part in the Accelerated Reader scheme is that, with as little as 20 minutes reading per day, your child's reading age can increase at twice their chronological development. While there are clear educational benefits to the Accelerated Reader scheme, it is still designed to be an enjoyable experience. We are promoting reading through regular practice in school. We also celebrate success through identifying the students who have engaged with the scheme most effectively.

All pupils have completed an online reading & comprehension assessment to identify their reading level. Please help us to ensure that your child gains the full benefits of this scheme by supervising their reading. Pupils then need to complete a quiz on every book they finish. As they pass quizzes they should choose more difficult books within their level.

So far this term our pupils have read over 60 million words!

Start will help your child to connect with their future career potential, develop their employability and help them to explore future career and study options at school or at home.

How should my child use it?

Students have been given their own account for **Start** at school, but it is accessible anytime on any computers and compatible mobile and tablet devices.

Your son/daughter has been encouraged this term to develop his/her profile on **Start** with details about their skills, qualities, interests and work preferences. This provides a starting point for them to explore information matched to **their personal preferences and interests. As they update their profile, Start will personalise this** information, helping them to navigate the thousands of jobs, courses, providers and opportunities available. **Start** will help students to understand where they are on their journey and what is important as they make their choices at GCSE, post-16 and post-18.

We encourage you to use **Start** with your child at home. Encourage them to rate jobs, qualifications, colleges or universities so that we can see their preferences in order to support them better.

Parents can also use **Start** to find out more about jobs, training and study opportunities.



International Athletics Success

Emily in Year 12 has recently participated at the English school championships for 300 hurdles, where she competed over two days to win the English schools title. Emily also represented England to take the Siab international title with a time of 42.63 seconds which placed her 1st in England, 5th in Europe and 14th in the World. In November Emily was, for the second time this year, selected for the England team and represented her country in Glasgow where England won the Gold medal.

Lessons from Auschwitz Project 2019

Earlier in the year, all Sixth Form students were given the opportunity to enter an essay-writing competition regarding the nature of Holocaust remembrance. We both wrote essays on 'the importance of keeping the flame of Holocaust remembrance alive' and subsequently were given the chance to attend the educational visit to Poland in November 2019. Prior to the trip, we had attended a preparation seminar in Manchester where we met the group we would be travelling with and learnt more about Jewish culture and history before the Holocaust. We discussed the idea that, when visiting Auschwitz I and

Auschwitz Birkenau we would have to look further than the sheer magnitude of the horrific event; we would try our hardest to re-humanise the victims of the Holocaust, focusing on personal stories and gaining a true understanding of the personal impacts of the genocide. On the 12th November 2019, we flew from Manchester Airport with a small group of other sixth form students from all around the North-West, to Oswiecim, Poland. Upon our arrival, we had a short coach journey to the small town of Oswiecim, in which we learnt more about the history of the town, it previously had a very large Jewish community, making up nearly 48% of the town's population. However, now, post-Holocaust, not a single Jewish person occupies the town. From here, we had another short bus journey to Auschwitz I concentration camp. Our 2 hours at the camp were incredibly enlightening and emotional. We spent our time learning about the Holocaust's murder of millions of Jews and evidently, the sheer magnitude of the genocide was undoubtedly daunting, yet, we felt most moved by the experience when we focused our attention upon the experiences of specific families and people, this allowed us to reach a point of relatability and recognise how terrible the suffering those at Auschwitz suffered and how they personally were impacted by the Third Reich. At Auschwitz I, I felt incredibly emotional reading and viewing the accounts of numerous victims of the Holocaust. Each of us was considerably moved by the exhibitions showing the suitcases snatched from the inhabitants by Nazis.

The exhibit of human hair exemplified the extent of atrocities committed against the victims in the camp, it showed how the Nazis not only stripped their victims of their lives and futures, but also their identities. Personally, I was moved by the room filled with disability aids. This exhibit showed a multitude of crutches, false legs and slings taken by force from those arriving at the camp. I found this room made me the most emotional as it caused me to realise that every single owner of these items was undoubtedly killed instantly due to their disability. I felt this highlighted the sheer inhumanity of the Holocaust more than any other exhibit, especially considering how we view disabled people in today's society.

Next, we visited Auschwitz Birkenau, which is notoriously associated round the world as the birth of the Holocaust. But, we discussed how it is incredibly important to look at the larger picture of the Holocaust and its impact around Europe, not only in camps like Auschwitz. Birkenau's most defining feature was its sheer size. Walking into the camp, it was impossible to view the camp as anything but a 'murder machine,' we saw the destroyed crematoria, the horrific conditions of the living quarters and the watch towers. Daisy felt the exhibit filled with family photographs was the most significant to her as she felt everybody could relate to the images: babies in baths, birthday parties and holiday snaps. It was so emotional to see these personal images depicting the lives of the Holocaust victims, who all had individual lives prior to the Nazi regime.

The entire experience was incredibly moving for us both and one we will never forget. In order to pass on our knowledge and our own experience we are planning to run informative lessons for classes within our school and hope these will inspire younger students to become involved in the project in later years.
